Course Textbook: College Algebra, 5th edition by Beecher, Penna, Bittinger, from Pearson. You will have access to a digital version of the textbook through MyLab Math in D2L Brightspace.

Course Description: College Algebra is an in-depth study and applications of polynomial, rational, exponential, and logarithmic functions, and system of equations using matrices.

Course requirements

Homework: There will be a homework assignment for each section we cover in class to be done online through D2L using MyLab Math. All due dates for homework and other online assignments such as quizzes will be given as material is covered in class.

Quizzes/Exams: There are four quizzes to be done online using MyLab Math. You can retake each quiz just once to improve your score; the higher score will be the one that counts. There may also be in-class quizzes. In-class quizzes cannot be made-up or retaken. There will be four chapter-exams and a comprehensive final. These will be done in class. **There are no retakes on any of the exams.**

Determination of Course Grade/Detailed Grading Formula: The course grade will be determined by the following formula:

$$10\% \text{ HW Average} + 15\% \text{ Quiz/CFA Average} + 60\% \text{ Exam Average} + 15\% \text{ Final Exam} = \text{Final Average}$$
