Required Textbook/Materials: This course will be using the OpenStax Psychology textbook. The OpenStax Psychology textbook is <u>*FREE*</u> to students and can be found online in our D2L course room. To access the textbook, login to our D2L course room and click *Content* tab then click the *Class Textbook* tab.

Course Description: This is an introduction to the field of psychology, dealing with such topics as the scientific method and theories, neuroscience and behavior, perception, consciousness, learning, memory, intelligence, motivation, emotion and stress, personality, psychological disorders, and therapy.

Course Requirements:

RESEARCH PARTICIPATION:

A. Option 1: Experimental Participation

This method requires you to participate in <u>three</u> online experiments for a total of 100 points. The online experiments are through Psychological Research on the Net and may be accessed here <u>https://psych.hanover.edu/research/exponnet.html#Educational</u>. You may choose any experiment to participate and complete online. The last day for participation is week 14. More information may be found in our D2L course room. Login and click *Content* tab then click the *Research Participation* tab.

B. Option 2: Two summaries of two published research articles

Any student that is unable to complete the online experiment may fulfill this requirement by submitting summaries of *two* published research articles. More information may be found in our D2L course room. Login and click *Content* tab then click the *Research Participation* tab.

CHAPTER QUIZZES:

There will be a total of 15 Chapter quizzes that will be done online in our D2L classroom. (See the section of "Required Textbook/Materials") with each quiz assignment having a **maximum of 100 points**. Quizzes will be assigned for each chapter.

All students must complete the chapter quizzes by the scheduled date. There are **NO Make-up quizzes**. **<u>NOTE</u>:** Please be aware that although you have one full week to complete the chapter quizzes it is discouraged to start close to the due date.

DISCUSSION BOARDS:

Each student will be required to complete 1 Introduction Forum and 14 Discussion Forum posts throughout the semester. These posts will allow you to discuss a topic related to the assigned chapter in greater depth.

In the Introduction Forum, each student will be required to complete an Introduction Post during the first week of classes. This post will allow you to introduce yourself to the class with a short biography. In this biography, you can include any details about yourself that will allow your fellow students to "put a person to the name". The Introductions Forum Post will be worth a **100 points.** Each Discussion Forum Post has the following instructions:

1. Review the assigned topic questions, article(s) or video(s)

- Post a brief description of the topic and/or answer required questions
- 3. Post a brief summary of their thoughts are on the topic
- 4. Reply to a minimum of two other student's posts

Each Discussion Forum Post will be worth a maximum of 100 points.

You will earn up to 35 points for your description of the topic and what you have learned, up to 35 points for your thoughts on the topic, and up to 30 points for your reply to another student.

NOTE: Responses can be deleted at the discretion of the instructor. Responses will only be deleted if the instructor determines them to be aggressive, rude, degrading, etc., and they may be deleted without notice to the student. All such responses will receive a grade of 0 for the deleted thread. Please refer to the syllabus for more information regarding student conduct and expectations.

IN CLASS ASSIGNMENTS: In class assignments are occasionally given as the instructor's way of ensuring students are actively coming to class, engaging in class, and reading the textbook. You will not know when the instructor will give these in class assignments. **NO IN-CLASS ASSIGNMENTS** can be made up but will be made available for students to use in study for exams. Two lowest assignment grades will be dropped at the end of the semester.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS: There will be 2 written assignments (essays) in this course. You are required to turn each assignment on D2L in the specified week. The instructions for each assignment will be announced and distributed in class and posted in our D2L course room. Login and click *Content* tab then click the *Essay* tab.

PRESENTATIONS:

Throughout the semester, students will have presentations as individuals and in groups. Each student will be required to complete 2 presentations throughout the semester. These Presentation will help students examine various topic in the field of psychology and identify how these impact our society on the community, state and national level. Further, this presentation will allow students to examine the

importance of being knowledgeable of their own personal biases and/or stereotypes, and how they can be more informed in their future interactions.

Each Presentation Post has the following instructions:

- 1. Research the assigned topic
- 2. Develop a 7-10 minute presentation on the topic. Specific instructions will be provided.
- 3. Share your presentation with the class. Specific instructions will be provided

Each Presentation will be worth a **maximum of 100 points**. You will earn up to 30 points for Quality of Information and Organization, up to 30 points for Quality of Verbal Communication, up to 30 points for Quality of Non-Verbal Communication and up to 10 points for the Written Summary.

ALL PRESENTATIONS LESS THAN 7 MINUTES WILL NOT BE GRADED!

EXAM:

There will be a total of 4 Exams, with each exam having a maximum of 100 points. Each exam will cover 4 chapters and have two parts. Part 1 of the exam will have a total of 40 questions (true/false, multiple choice, matching) and Part 2 of the exam will be short answers or essay. Exams will be timed and you will have the total class time to complete each exam.

All students must complete the exams in class. There are **NO Make-up Exams**. Students arriving to the exam more than 20 minutes late will not be allowed to take the exam.
