Course Description: English 1302 requires intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based argumentative, expository, and multi-genre texts. The emphasis of this course is on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of visual, verbal, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions. Activities and assignments include blogs, discussions, essays, research, and a group project. Note that this course is themed around absurdity and social epidemics. *All assignments must have proper MLA formatted works cited pages attached to receive credit.*

Course Prerequisite: English 1301 (Note: You will not receive credit for this course unless you have already completed English 1301 with a grade of "C" or higher. Students are not allowed to take English 1301 and English 1302 at the same time. If you have not passed 1301, you must inform your professor immediately to avoid further problems.

Course Requirements & Grading Formula:

This course is collaborative in nature. You will participate in discussions, class activities, and peer review. You will be expected to read and view content in preparation for class discussions and writing projects. You will be expected to conduct research, analyze results, and make logical arguments.

30% You will complete 4 journal assignments this semester which will require reading and view content and research:

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Journal Entry 1: The Power of Story
Journal Entry 2: Why Fairy Tales Matter
Journal Entry 3: The Human Condition
Journal Entry 4: The Creative Mind
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The journal entries will prepare you to write an in-depth argumentative essay. These assignments include:

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05% Project Proposal15% Annotated Bibliography35% Argumentative Essay
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05% Self-Reflection Video Essay

Your final assignment is a Self-Reflection Video Essay where you will discuss your research, critical thinking, writing process, and argument.

Attendance in a face-to-face class (F2F) means **showing up on time** for every class and **staying until class is dismissed**. Attendance is mandatory and roll is taken at the start of class. Participation

Grace Period for Late Milestone Writing Project Assignments

All essays will be submitted to TurnItIn in D2L/Brightspace –a software that checks papers for plagiarism and artificial intelligence (AI).

Do not use AI without instructor permission and guidance. Do not use Grammarly to edit your work (Grammarly contains a generative AI tool that is flagged as plagiarism by TurnItIn). Do not use ChatGPT, Quillbot, or other AI generators, paraphrasing tools, or rephrasing tools for

academic essays without instructor permission and guidance. *You may use the style, combo, and grammar tools in ProWritingAid to edit your work; however do not use the Rephrase tool.

Claiming someone else's words as your own (copy/pasting or turning in a borrowed or bought paper) is *completely unacceptable*. Students who blatantly plagiarize will receive a grade of 0 and will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for the appropriate disciplinary action.

At the instructor's discretion, accidental plagiarism will be dealt with in the following manner: The instructor will counsel the student regarding improper or missing citations. The student will be given an opportunity to revise their work to include the proper citations. The corrected work will receive reduced credit.
