Course Description: Teach Students to Speak Effectively, Teach Students to Understand The Communication Process.

Course requirements: Five Presentations including the Introduction Speech, Group Speech, Tribute Speech, Informative Speech, and Persuasive Speeches. Four Unit Tests and a Final Examination.

Determination of Course Grade/Detailed Grading Formula: Evaluation of Speeches, Academic Work counts as 45% of the final grade. Speaking Grades account for 45% of the final grade, Attendance counts for 10% of the final grade. Subjective Evaluation of Written Work, and Objective Examinations.
