Course Description:

English 1302 involves the intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for development research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphases are on the effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions.

Prerequisite: An earned grade of “C” or better in English 1301.

Course requirements:

1. *CAJDQP (Class Activities, Journals, Discussion, Quizzes, and Participation) (10%)* – Class activities, journal and discussion prompts, and quizzes will be assigned when necessary to highlight course concepts in alignment with major course assignments.
2. *Revision and Editing Activities (20%)* – This aspect of the writing process will utilize different techniques as presented in course material. The essay rough draft will be due by the beginning of class, as specified on the essay assignment sheet. This draft is required to complete the revision and editing activities before a final draft of an essay is submitted in Brightspace.

3. *Essay Assignments (25%)* – Three essays will be assigned during the semester. Each essay will need to be completed in MLA format and 3-4 pages in length.
4. *Presentation Assignment (15%)* – A paper presentation will be completed as an extension of one of the essay assignments. Information will be included on the essay assignment sheet.
5. *Argumentative Research Project (30%)* – A longer (6-7 pages) researched argumentative essay will be assigned at the beginning of the semester. Topics will be assigned during class. Additional research activities will be completed in preparation for the submission of the final research paper and are included in this grading percentage.

Late Work, Make-Up, and Extra-Credit Policy:

Late Work/Make-up Policy: Deadlines are posted on Brightspace, the course syllabus, and assignment sheets given in class. Assignments must be turned in to Brightspace by the due date given for each assignment. Assignments turned in the next day will receive a deduction of 20 points from the total grade. Papers turned in beyond this point will not be accepted unless special arrangements are made BEFORE the due date. NOTE: Absences at any point in the semester will not affect your due dates. Don't get caught believing you have extra days to turn in an assignment just because you have been absent. Communicating the issues you are having early on before any due date is vital.

Extra Credit: Extra Credit will only be awarded in two ways. 1) Five points extra credit will be applied to any essay reviewed by the COM Writing Center or Net Tutor. Evidence of the writing center visit must be e-mailed to me before the paper is due. These extra credit points will only be applied if the final paper is submitted on time. 2) Three additional percentage points will be awarded to students who complete the online course evaluation at the end of the semester.

Attendance Policy:

You are expected to be prepared and in class on time, ready to fully participate. Class discussion and group activities are components of your success in this course. A sign-in sheet will be provided each class to keep a record of attendance. Be sure you are signing in when you enter the

classroom. If you are going to be absent, be sure to keep up with the work. Unexcused absences will not mean automatic extensions on class assignments. Remember excessive absences (4+) will result in a grade of FN.

****Tardies*: It is vital to the classroom experience to be on time for class. Three tardies will equal one absence.

Avoiding Plagiarism: Research material must be cited both in the document and on a Work Cited Page. (MLA documentation style applies to all College of the Mainland English, humanities, philosophy, or speech classes). Remember to document when:

- ✓ Evidence is quoted directly from a source.
- ✓ Ideas from another source are paraphrased or summarized.

- ✓ Facts (i.e. statistics) or visual material from other sources must be documented.
