Professor's Suarez Personal Course Description: The goal of this course is to help you be successful in ENGL 1301. In it, we will be practicing the fundamentals of writing, beginning with grammar. In addition, you will be assigned time to work on ENGL 1301 coursework, and you will be required to complete an extra credit post for ENGL 1301 weekly. Not only will you be learning content, but you will be pushed to learn how to manage your time effectively, complete assignments with full effort, and work with/alongside your peers.

IRW 0320 Catalog Description: This course is a co-requisite class for English Composition 1301. This course carries institutional credit and may not be used to meet degree requirements. Placement: (1) TSI Essay—score 2 or 3 with TSI Writing multiple choice score of 340-349 or (2) TSI Reading-score of 342-350 or (3) Successful completion ("C"or better) of Read 0340 or ENGL 0330 prior to 8/31/2014 or (4) Successful completion ("C" or better of IRW 0300). This course does not transfer.

Required Materials: There is no required text for this course. All materials related to the grammar concept packets/quizzes/etc. are created by me and will be provided to you in printed form. The only materials that you will be required to bring to class daily are the following:

- Pencil/pen
- Materials from previous weeks (I recommend that you keep a folder specifically for IRW and a folder for ENGL 1301)
- If you use a personal laptop, I highly recommend you bring and use it in class instead of the classroom computers; this can ensure that you are learning how to complete assignments on the computer you will be using at home.

Course Requirements:

Attendance: Because this course is aimed to help you be successful in ENGL 1301, your attendance in this course is crucial. Similar to ENGL 1301, attendance will be accounted for as a grade, where one absence = -1pt and 2 leave early/arrive late = -1pt

ENGL 1301 Effort + Extra Credit: You will receive a weekly grade out of 10 points that will be based on the following:

- ENGL 1301 extra credit post submitted by Friday (2/10)
- ENGL 1301 journal post submitted by Sunday (2/10)
- ENGL 1301 weekly assignment submitted by Monday (4/10)
- Utilizing workshop time in class + staying on task in IRW (2/10)

These grades will be distributed every Tuesday for the previous week. For example, Week 1's grade will be posted Tuesday of Week 2.

Grammar Practice Packets | Due Thursdays 9am

This summer we will be discussing and practicing eight (8) different grammar concepts. GC practice packets/worksheets are due fully completed every Thursday (with the exception of 4th of July). This is a completion grade and we will review the answers together as a class the day the packet is due. Be sure to complete the packet in pencil so you can make corrections accordingly. If you are absent on the day your packet is due, you will need to either email it to me or show it to me the next class day. Unfortunately, this will mean that you will miss out on the answers and will still need to take the quiz on Friday with everyone else.

Grammar Concept Quizzes | Fridays 9am

Each week, you will take a grammar concept quiz that covers the material that we learned that week. See the make-up policy on the next page for what to do if you are absent on a quiz day.

Grammar Concept Presentation | Week 9-10

Though the goal is to understand all grammar concepts, you will be tasked with mastering one. Toward the end of the semester – as we review for the grammar final – you will be required to create a presentation on a grammar concept we went over throughout the semester. You must develop some kind of lesson plan related to the grammar concept + a practice worksheet to give to your classmates and myself. More details will be given toward the end of the course.

Grammar Concept Final | TH 8/8

Week 10 will include a mastery exam that will cover the grammar concepts that we have learned and practiced together. The questions you see on these exams are questions you will have already seen before on previous quizzes (in other words, keep your quizzes!).

Course Grade Determination: This course is designed to ensure your success in ENGL 1301, but it is also aimed at more than just "academic" success in this classroom. The goal is to challenge you to become better at life skills that will carry into other aspects of your life, such as time management, effort, engagement, and responsibility. As long as you are willing to put forth effort, be open minded and work to the best of your ability, you will pass this course.

Late Work/Make-Up Policy: Assignments in this course have predetermined and recurring due dates. As a result, there is no late work policy. You are required to complete all work on time, even if you are absent. Be sure to check the weekly IRW PPT to ensure that you are completing the checklist tasks. If you are absent on a quiz day, you will need to make up the quiz the following class day (in most cases on Monday). If you do not make up the quiz by then, you will receive a zero and have one last opportunity to take the quiz on the day of the final or on the "make-up day" during Week 10 for up to a 70.

Extra Credit Opportunities: There is no extra credit given in this class though there are opportunities for ENGL 1301.

Attendance Policy: Attendance is required to be successful in the class. Missing class will result in getting behind in learning material and losing time to work on material in class and ask me questions. Per COM policy, no absences are considered excused unless for religious or military service reasons.

Academic Dishonesty: Any incident of academic policy will be dealt with per college policy and the Student Handbook.
