ENGL 1301 Course Description: Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis.

Professor Suarez's Personal Course Description: This course is designed to do two things: (1) help you discover + cultivate your voice within your education and coursework, and (2) introduce you to the writing process of working toward an academic research paper.

Course Requirements:

Attendance/Timeliness/Participation:

Attendance and arriving on time to class is crucial to your success – not just in this class but in life. For each day you are absent, one point will be deducted from your attendance grade (out of a total of 16 days). Two tardies will be equivalent to one absence. Those who are late to class will find that they miss out on pertinent information and reminders. An occasional 5 minutes late is one thing, but making a habit of it will not be tolerated. Participation will be assessed at the end of the semester. The rule of thumb here is that if I cannot remember you ever participating in group activities, speaking in class, or completing course assignments and HW, then your grade will not be high.

HW | Weekly

This is a hybrid class; therefore, you can expect to have HW to complete outside of class. This might entail reading course materials, watching instructional videos I have posted, practicing and submitting something, completing work you did not finish in class, and/or anything else that I might assign throughout the semester.

Quizzes | Occasional

You can expect quizzes as my way of gauging your understanding of the material that we are covering. These will be brief quizzes that can range from multiple choice to short written responses. They could be open-note, closed-note, individual, or group-based. I seldom give a "pop" quiz. That being said, make sure that you are aware that I expect you to learn and remember the skills I am teaching you. Quizzes will be completed during class and will be paper-based. If you are absent, you will receive a zero and you will have one week to make up the quiz during our next class and/or during my office hours.

Weekly/Writing Process Assignments | Due dates vary

In this course, you will have something due every week. Rest assured, I am not asking you to write an essay every week! Instead, this class emphasizes the writing process, so each weekly assignment will be related to working toward whatever the major assignment for the unit is. Sometimes assignments will be due at the end of class, meaning it is imperative to always do your present to be present every class day.

Final Exam | Week 8

This semester you will complete a take-home, free-response final review packet + an in-class final exam which tests your understanding of the course material.

Presentations | Week 3 + Week 8

In ENGL 1301, you are required to complete some form of oral presentation. You will be required to speak in class a lot, the hope is that these presentations will get easier as the class progresses. The fist presentation is related to your first major assignment and the second presentation is an iteration of your EOC Reflection. More details will be given when the time nears.

Course Grade Determination: Your grade will be a reflection of your time management, effort, and willingness to listen to lectures, ask questions, and read assignment sheets thoroughly. In other words, your grade is ultimately a product of the effort that you put forth. I want you to be successful in this course, but it is ultimately up to you if you are. Please see the late-work policy and contract agreement in regard to late, missed, and incomplete assignments.

A Note on Balancing Life + Academics: I am aware that, for some, school is one of many daily responsibilities. Because of this, I have designed this course with built-in "work days" to not only work on upcoming major assignments, but to receive feedback from myself and your peers. Please take advantage of these days and show up ready to work. You will find that workdays are really beneficial because you can ask me any questions you have and I can give you feedback on the spot.

Attendance Policy: You should aim to be in class every day. Missing class due to conflicting appointments, jobs, and/or sleeping in too late are not excuses. You signed up for this specific time, so I do expect you to be present as much as you possibly can. Per COM policy, no absences are considered excused unless for religious or military service reasons. If you are going to be absent for any of those reasons, I need to be notified ahead of time. This does not excuse you from completing the work for that day, but it does (sometimes) grant you an extension to make it up. Remember that attendance and timeliness factor into your grade. Point deductions can also be received for leaving class early before class is dismissed.

Please note that I do have the right to drop you from the course for lack of attendance. Missing more than 4 class days can result in the inability to receive higher than a "C" for the course.

Late Work/Make-Up Policy: Timely completion of all assignments is crucial. Please know that not completing an assignment sets you back because each assignment builds on a major assignment. It is really in your best interest to complete every assignment on time with full effort. Late or corrected incomplete assignments will not receive extensive feedback.

• Late Assignments: Assignments submitted within 2 days of the original due date will receive a half-letter grade deduction every 12 hr (up to 2 letter grades = 48hr late).

- **Missed Assignments:** Assignments that are not submitted within 2 days of the original due date are assignments that will receive a zero.
 - You will fail the course if your research paper rough draft, full draft, or final draft become missed assignments.
- Incomplete Assignment: Assignments submitted on time or within the 2-day submission period that do not meet one or multiple requirements (E.g., no works cited page, length requirement, no in-text citations, etc.) are considered incomplete. These assignments will be graded as zeros, and the student will have the opportunity to correct this within a given amount of time as deemed appropriate by Prof. Suarez
 - All incomplete assignments must be corrected and marked as complete in order to receive an A in the class.
 - More than one incomplete assignment is subject to a 10-point (full letter grade) deduction on end-of-semester average
 - More than two incomplete assignments that are not corrected = F

24-Hr Late Submission Opportunity (The "Life Happens" Clause):

- You will have **one 24-hr late submission opportunity** that you can utilize on any assignment except for the items listed below:
 - Research Paper: Rough Draft, quizzes, extra credit stuff, review packets, peer reviews, presentations, exams, or assigned HW, exams

Written Feedback: You will receive feedback from me on all writing process and reflection assignments. If I ever give you feedback that you do not understand, please reach out and we can set up a time to go over it. I understand that you cannot improve if you do not understand the advice I am giving. Help me help you.

Extra Credit Opportunities: The opportunity below only applies to assignments that you completed.

 Weekly Extra Credit Posts: Each week, there will be an opportunity to post in a discussion post for all of your classmates to see. For every discussion you participate in, you can receive I extra credit point (for a total of 8). These extra credit points will be tallied up at the end of the semester and added toward your lowest assignment grade.
