Required Textbook: Corrections, an Introduction (5th or 6th edition); Author: Richard P. Seiter, Publisher: Pearson. 5th Edition ISBN: 9780134164113. 6th edition ISBN: 9780135235478 loose leaf). Supplementary materials will post in D2L.

Course Description: This course is a survey of institutional and non-institutional corrections. Emphasis will be placed on the organization and operation of correctional systems; treatment and rehabilitation; populations served; Constitutional issues; and current and future issues.

Course requirements: This is an 8-week course (3/10/25 - 5/8/25). You are required to read the chapters as listed on the course outline and any related lecture notes or outlines. Viewing the respective power point presentations will reinforce your reading. I will post supplemental material in Content on occasion that is considered course material. You are responsible for this material for exam purposes (unless otherwise stated).

You are required to take 3 exams (200 points each), submit 3 assignments (50 points each), complete a power point project (50 points), and post to five (5) discussions (10 points each). Although quizzes are optional and have no point value for your grade, I highly recommend that you take them for self-assessment value. Exams will be taken online and will be open between 4-5 days, including a weekend, to accommodate various schedules.

Exams may be accessed through the "Quizzes" link on the menu. Look on the course outline to determine your exam weeks (Week 2 - Exam 1, Week 4 - Exam 2, Weeks 7/8 - Exam 3. All exams are timed. Exams must be taken in the Respondus Lockdown browser. Please contact me if you have computer problems while taking an exam.

Discussions: For full credit, postings to a discussion topic should consist of a short paragraph, with a minimum of 200 words. Each discussion topic is worth up to 10 points

each. I encourage you to respond to a fellow student for each posting (although no credit). You are expected to read at least 75% of the postings. Our discussion board takes the place of a live classroom discussion and as such, you may be exposed to many different concepts and beliefs concerning various criminal justice issues. Be respectful of your classmates when posting or responding to a discussion. Your comments and thoughts are part of the learning process. Do not use "text" spelling. Please use correct grammar, spelling, capitalization, and punctuation. Maximum points will not be given for informal, incomplete, very brief, or not in compliance postings. A post may be deleted from view if it is disrespectful, crude, or contains offensive language.

Written Assignments: Detailed instructions for assignments are contained within the individual assignments located in the menu link "Assignments". All written assignments must be typed and submitted in either Microsoft Word file format (.docx or .doc) or in a PDF format using a font no smaller than 10 points and no larger than 12 points. Please take advantage of the COM Tutoring Center if you need assistance with your written assignments. You submit your written assignments by attaching your document into the respective assignment box. I will attempt to grade and return your assignments within 4 days of the due date. Please feel free to contact me if you have not received a grade. You are responsible for keeping copies of all your assignments turned in for grades.

Power point project: The power point project requires that you prepare a minimum 25slide presentation on an issue related to Corrections. This is due 4/23/25 (contained in the course outline). Detailed instructions are contained within the Power Point project assignment located in Assignments. Many electronic resources available to you through the COM Library. Use academic search engines such as ProQuest which may be found in LibGuides located on the COM Library website. Wikipedia is not an academic resource and will not be counted as such. If cited, you will receive no credit.
