Required Textbook/Materials: We will utilize American YAWP free online textbook. The link has been provided. <u>https://www.americanyawp.com/</u>. Students will also be required to have a copy of *Heirs of the Founders: The Second Generation of American Giants* by H.W. Brands which will be provided by the instructor.

Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstruction period. United States History I includes the study of pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War/Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and creation of the federal government.

Course requirements:

<u>Writing Assignments-</u> After each unit's reading, students will select an outside primary or secondary source that relates to it. In a One Drive document, the student will answer three questions about their selected source. The purpose of the One Drive format is so that the instructor can provide feedback on a regular basis so that the student may revise the document before the final turn in. The final products will be turned in by providing a link to the document in Brightspace. Further instructions will be available on Brightspace.

Discussions- Each unit students will be assigned a reading from *Heirs of the Founders* to supplement the lecture. One day of each week we will conduct a classroom discussion of the reading. To receive full credit a student must contribute to the discussion 10 times. To receive credit students must make a significant contribution to the discussion, simple closed ended answers like "I agree" or "yes/no" will not count. Students will receive punch cards to keep track of their contributions.

<u>Activity Participation</u>- Each unit we will participate in activities designed to supplement the week's lecture. Students are expected to participate in the week's activity.

<u>Activity Reflection</u>- Each unit, students will create a One Drive document entry reflecting on their participation in that week's activity. The reflection will include student experience in the activity and how it connects and expands on the lecture.

Exam- At the end of the course, students will have a 50-question exam. The exam will be multiple choice questions based on the key terms from each lecture.
