Course Description: This course is a survey of the development of British literature from the Anglo-Saxon period to the Eighteenth Century. Students will study works of prose, poetry, drama, and fiction in relation to their historical, linguistic, and cultural contexts. Texts will be selected from a diverse group of authors and traditions.

There will be a research assignment. There will be at least one oral presentation. In addition, you will be required to read every night and participate in class EVERY DAY.
