Required Textbook:

Psychology in Everyday Life, 5th edition; by David G. Myers; published by Worth Publishers.

Course Description:

General Psychology is a survey of the major psychological topics, theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Prerequisites: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test + 5 or higher on Essay, or IRW 0320 with a grade of "C" or better. This is an academic transfer course.

Course requirements

Communication:

Communication will take place primarily through COM email, so be sure to check your email regularly.

I prefer for students to contact me directly through my COM email address. Please put “Online PSYCHOLOGY Student” in the subject area.

It is my policy to respond to discussion posts, messages, and emails within 48 hours, weekends and holidays excepted. I do hold my students to this same policy, so be sure to check your COM email regularly.

Quiz and Exam grades will be posted immediately to your Grade Center, and grades for Journal Posts and Discussion Forums will generally be updated twice a week on Wednesday and Saturday.

Participation:

You are expected to log into the course a **minimum of two times per week** and you should expect to spend at least 2 ½ hours a week in the course reviewing lessons and other course material.

The discussion component of the course requires you to engage your fellow students in “conversation,” which requires you to regularly read and respond to posts. Due to the online nature of this course, it is up to the student to provide thoughtful and elaborate responses to discussion posts in order for the instructor to measure the students’ understanding of the material. In addition, any aggressive, rude, degrading, etc., posts may be deleted without notice to the student. All such responses will receive a grade of 0 for the deleted thread.

Please understand that minimal participation will result in minimal points.

More information about expectations in regards to your postings and replies is provided below in the Grading Rubrics.

Method of Instruction:

This course primarily consists of online lessons and discussions provided by the instructor. Additionally, videos and other supplementary articles may be used to emphasize key issues. The online lessons parallel and reinforce assigned readings; therefore it is essential that students keep up to date with their online work. The online lessons will be open for one week, giving you plenty of time to complete the required materials.

Coursework Policy:

All coursework will be assigned and opened online on a weekly basis. For this course, weeks begin at **12:00am** on the **MONDAY** of the assigned week and end at 11:59pm on the SUNDAY of the assigned week.

EXCEPTION: Due to it being the last week of classes, **Week 16** will be short week. Accommodations have been made and Week 16 assignments will open at 12:00am on Saturday of Week 15 and close at 5:00pm on **WEDNESDAY** of Week 16.

Late Work/Make-Up Policy:

There are **NO** make-up quizzes, assignments, discussions or exams! With **NO** exception! I leave them all open for a wide period of time to give you every opportunity to complete them within the required period. The dates and times that the graded materials are available will be clearly visible in our course. The due dates will also be posted on the course schedule.

Failure to complete an assignment: All assignments will be due by the date assigned by the professor. **NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED.**

Chapter Quizzes:

There will be a total of 13 Chapter Quizzes and one syllabus quiz, with each quiz having a **maximum of 20 points**. Quizzes will be assigned for each chapter and each quiz will have a total of 10 questions. Chapter Quizzes may include a combination of true/false, multiple choice, and/or matching questions. Each Chapter Quiz will be timed and you will have a total of 15 minutes to complete each quiz.

All students must complete the online quizzes by the scheduled date. There are **NO Make-up Quizzes**.

NOTE: Please be aware that although you have one full week to take the quizzes, once the quiz has started it must be completed in one timed session.

Discussion Forum Posts:

Each student will be required to complete 1 Introduction Forum and 12 Discussion Forum posts throughout the semester. These posts will allow you to discuss a topic related to the assigned chapter in greater depth.

In the Introduction Forum, each student will be required to complete an Introduction Post during the first week of classes. This post will allow you to introduce yourself to the class with a short biography. In this biography, you can include any details about yourself that will allow your fellow students to “put a person to the name”. The Introductions Forum Post will be worth a **maximum of 20 points**.

Each Discussion Forum Post has the following instructions:

1. Review the assigned article(s) or video(s)

2. Post a brief description of the topic and discuss what they have learned
3. Post a brief summary of their thoughts are on the topic
4. Reply to a minimum of one other student's posts and rate it

Each Discussion Forum Post will be worth a **maximum of 15 points**.

You will earn up to 5 points for your description of the topic and what you have learned, up to 5 points for your thoughts on the topic, and up to 5 points for your reply to another student.

NOTE: Responses can be deleted at the discretion of the instructor. Responses will only be deleted if the instructor determines them to be aggressive, rude, degrading, etc., and they may be deleted without notice to the student. All such responses will receive a grade of 0 for the deleted thread. Please refer to the syllabus for more information regarding student conduct and expectations.

Presentation Post:

Each student will be required to complete 4 Presentation Posts throughout the semester. This Presentation Post will help students examine some of the ethical issues within psychology and identify how these impact our society on the community, state and national level. Further, this presentation will allow students to examine the importance of being knowledgeable of their own personal biases and/or stereotypes, and how they can be more informed in their future interactions.

Each Presentation Post has the following instructions:

1. Review the assigned Discussion Forum topic(s)
2. Develop and record a **5 minute** minimum presentation. Specific instructions will be provided in Brightspace.
3. Write a brief outline of your presentation (1 page minimum).
4. Share your presentation with the instructor through YouTube, Screen-Cast-O-Matic, etc..

Each Presentation Post will be worth a **maximum of 35 points**. You will earn up to 10 points for Quality of Information and Organization, up to 10 points for Quality of Verbal Communication, up to 10 points for Quality of Non-Verbal Communication and up to 5 points for the Written Summary.

ALL PRESENTATIONS LESS THAN 5 MINUTES WILL NOT BE GRADED!

Exams:

There will be a total of 4 Exams, with each exam having a maximum of 100 points. Exams will be broken down into sections containing between 2 and 4 chapters, and each exam will have a total of 100 questions. Exams may include a combination of true/false, multiple choice, matching, and/or short answer questions. Exams will be timed and you will have a total of 120 minutes to complete each exam.

All students must complete the online exams by the scheduled date. There are **NO Make-up Exams**.

NOTE: Please be aware that although you have one full week to take the exam, once the exam has been started it must be completed in one timed session.

The discussion component of the course also requires you to engage your fellow students in “conversation,” which requires you to regularly read and respond to posts. **For each week that you do not log in twice this semester, 15 points (per week) will be deducted from your overall points total.**
