ENGL 1301 Course Description: Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis.

Professor Suarez's Personal Course Description: This course is designed to do two things: (1) help you discover + cultivate your voice within your education and coursework, and (2) introduce you to the writing process necessary for working toward an academic writing paper rooted in secondary research with a sprinkle of your own primary research.

Communication Policy: You can either email me at my campus email, message me on Teams via your COM Microsoft Office account, or send me a message through D2L Brightspace. Whichever option you choose, ALL electronic communication with me (your instructor) must be through your COM email/account. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means. If you send me an email and I do not reply, double-check that you sent it from the right place or that it was sent successfully. I have had some instances where I never receive an email because a student forgot to press "send". I respond within 8-12hr (often less than this depending on the time of day).

Course Modality (Asynchronous Online): This is an asynchronous, online course, meaning that we will not meet at a scheduled time. Instead, you will be required to view/read course material and complete your work on your own time. This allows for more flexibility; however, this course <u>does</u> have required due dates that you must abide by. Because this is a 3-week course (I actually say it is 2.5 weeks since grades are due Friday of Week 3), you will have multiple, required due dates throughout the week to ensure you are working on the course every single day. This will also benefit you because you will not be able to wait until the last minute to complete the work for the week.

Textbook/Materials - OER Course: Anything that we read in this course will be accessible through D2L Brightspace and free. If you would like to print something out and do not have a printer, COM's Tutoring Center offers free printing (found in ICB, Building #23, 1st floor) as well as the COM Library.

Weekly HW | Due dates vary

Your completion of weekly HW is crucial not only to your success, but it is also a way for me to assess whether or not you are engaging with the learning material. Outside of the major assignments, HW may include watching weekly videos, listening to podcasts, reading/viewing assigned materials, and posting multiple DB comments per week and/or responding to peers.

Writing Process Assignments | Due dates vary

You will be working toward your final paper every day during this Spring Mini. Rest assured, I am not asking you to write an essay every week! Instead, this class emphasizes the writing process, so each writing assignment will be related to working toward whatever the major assignment for the unit is.

Quizzes | Due dates vary

There will be quizzes that gauge your understanding and interaction with that week's materials. That being said, make sure that you are aware that I expect you to learn and remember the skills I am teaching you. It is imperative that you are reading announcements and watching/listening to the weekly podcast/video in order to prepare for the quiz. These quizzes can range from multiple choice to short written responses. These questions will come up on the Final, so be sure that when you receive your results that you are actively checking to see what you are not understanding so that you know what to study for.

Final Exam | Week 3, due by Thursday 11:59pm (no extensions)

This final exam will test your understanding of the course material learned during this mini session. This will consist of multiple-choice questions and short responses.

"Oral Presentation" | DB#4

In ENGL 1301, you are required to complete some form of oral presentation. Because of the nature of an online course, your "oral presentation" will take the form of your DB#4 post. In addition to writing your post, you will be required to submit an audo recording of you reading your post out loud.

Late Work/Make-Up Policy:

Timely completion of all assignments is crucial, especially in a 3-week course. Please know that not completing an assignment sets you back because most assignments build on one another. It is really in your best interest to complete every assignment on time with full effort. Late assignments will not receive extensive feedback.

You may not submit DB#3 (Peer Review) late! If you do not submit part 1 of DB#3 on time, you will forfeit the opportunity to receive feedback on your paper + will still be required to complete a peer review response.

- Late Items You may submit an item late within 1 day of the original due date, but you will receive a letter grade deduction: 1-12 hr late = -letter grade, 12-24hr = -2 letter grades
- **Missed Items:** Assignments that are not submitted within 1 day of the original due date are assignments that will receive a permanent zero. This includes discussion posts and quizzes.
 - You will fail the course if your research paper final draft is not submitted by the due date.

Since these tasks often build on one another, my turnaround time for grading is pretty quick, depending on the complexity of the assignment. My general goal for this May Mini is to have grades inputted within 48 hr of the submission deadline (unless you submit something late). If I ever give you feedback that you do not understand, please reach out and we can set up a time to go over it. I understand that you cannot improve if you do not understand the advice I am giving. Help me help you.
