Communication Policy: You can either email me at my campus email, message me on Teams via your COM Microsoft Office account, or send me a message through D2L Brightspace. Whichever option you choose, ALL electronic communication with me (your instructor) must be through your COM email/account. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means.

If you send me an email and I do not reply, double-check that you sent it from the right place or that it was sent successfully. I have had some instances where I never received an email because a student forgot to press “send” or because a student sent an email through their personal email account.

Course Modality (Hybrid): This is a hybrid course, meaning that learning takes place in-person and online. You are expected to show up, learn, and participate in the classroom and on Brightspace each week. While meeting only 2 days a week offers more flexibility with schedules, this course is quick and has required due dates that you must abide by. You will have multiple, required due dates throughout the week. This is meant to benefit you and ensure that you do not wait until the last minute to complete the work for the week.

ENGL 1301 Course Catalog Description: Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis.

Professor Suarez's Personal Course Description: This course is designed to do two things: (1) help you discover + cultivate your voice within your education and coursework, and (2) introduce you to the writing process necessary for working toward an academic writing paper rooted in secondary research with a sprinkle of your own primary research.

Textbook – OER Course: Anything that we read in this course will be accessible through D2L Brightspace and free. If you would like to print something out and do not have a printer, COM's Tutoring Center offers free printing (found in ICB, Building #23, 1st floor) as well as the COM Library.

Required/Recommended Materials:

- **Required:** A pencil/pen brought to class each day
- **Required:** Reliable internet access + a device to complete online assignments
- A notebook to take notes as you see fit
- A folder/binder for handouts and HW
- A planner to keep track of due dates
- If you have a personal laptop, I encourage you to bring it to class if you are able. This will allow you to learn how to complete tasks on the same device you will be using at home. If you cannot bring this to class, it is okay. Our classroom is a computer lab.

Course Requirements:

Attendance/Timeliness/Participation: Your in-person attendance and online presence is important. In-person attendance is determined by your showing up to class on time and participating. Your online presence is not solely based on logging into our Brightspace course shell; you must also view/complete all assigned weekly requirements. Failure to complete required work for 1 full week (in-person & online) may result in being dropped from the course. If not dropped, it more than likely will result in you failing the course.

In-person Attendance Grade: 25 points total

- 1st absence = no penalty
- Every tardy (10+ minutes late) = -1.25pt (2 tardies = 1 absence)
- Every absence after your 1st one = -2.5pt

Online Attendance Grade: 25 points total

- 1st missed or late online submission ever = no penalty toward this grade
- Every late online weekly submission = -1.25pt
- Every missed online weekly submission = -2.5pt

Participation: 10 points total

There will be many opportunities to participate in class. In fact, there will always be something that you will be required to do/discuss/contribute every class day. You will receive a participation grade during Week 5 reflective of your willingness to complete in-class work, participate in group activities, speak in class, and complete course assignments/HW.

Research Project (Public Issue/Problem-Solution or Informative): The crux of the course is centered on this project. Though you will not be writing multiple papers in this class, the writing process assignments will require you to think critically about the topic you choose and the sources, audience, and content most appropriate for what will eventually lead to the final draft of a Problem-Solution or Informative Research Paper. This project will also require that you complete secondary research with an opportunity to conduct primary research of your own.

ENGL 1301 Journal (5 entries) | All entries due by Sunday 6/29 11:59pm

Inspired by the journal assignment in *Freedom Writers* (a movie we will watch together), you will be asked to complete five (5) journal entries in this class, which you will complete via the discussion board titled "Journal." All five entries must be at least 300 words and you should be prepared to read one of your entries out loud on the last day of class.

Online HW: DBs, Writing Process Assignments, & Assessments | T, TH & SN

Online HW includes reading/watching assigned materials, completing discussion board posts, quizzes, and a final exam. Online HW will always be due on Tuesday, Thursday, and Sunday. See specific on next page.

Discussion Boards (DB): Unlike the ENGL 1301 Journal, DBs require formal, academic writing. These discussion posts have prompts and specific due dates. These posts are always related to the content we are focusing on in class.

Writing Process Assignments: Though I am not asking you to write an essay every week, this class emphasizes the writing process, so each writing process assignment you complete (E.g., Research Proposal, Works Cited, Annotated Bibliography, etc.) helps you work toward the major Research Project. Please note that we will go over each assignment in detail and class will be dedicated to working on these assignments and/or learning the content you need to know to complete these assignments successfully.

Quizzes: There will be online/open-note quizzes that gauge your understanding of and interaction with the course material. Questions will consist of multiple-choice/true or false/written response/etc.

Final Exam (due Tuesday 7/1 11:59pm)

This final exam will test your understanding of all course material learned during this summer session and will consist of multiple-choice, T/F, and short response questions.

Course Grade Determination: Your grade will be a reflection of your time management, effort, and willingness to listen to lectures, ask questions, and complete work thoroughly. In other words, your grade is ultimately a product of the effort that you put forth. I want you to be successful in this course, but it is ultimately up to you if you are. Your grade will be assessed based on a point system with a total of 500 points possible (see previous page).

A Note on Balancing Life + Academics: I am aware that, for some, school is one of *many* daily responsibilities. Because of this, I have designed this course with built-in “work days” to not only work on upcoming major assignments, but to receive feedback from myself and your peers. Please take advantage of these days and show up ready to work. You will find that workdays are really beneficial because you can ask me any questions you have and I can give you feedback on the spot.

Attendance Policy: You should aim to be in class every day. Missing class due to conflicting appointments, jobs, and/or sleeping in too late are not excuses. You signed up for this specific time, so I do expect you to be present as much as you possibly can. Per COM policy, no absences are considered excused unless for religious or military service reasons. If you are going to be absent for any of those reasons, I need to be notified ahead of time. This does not excuse you from completing the work for that day, but it does (sometimes) grant you an extension to make it up. Remember that attendance and timeliness factor into your grade. Point deductions can also be received for leaving class early before class is dismissed.

Please note that I do have the right to drop you from the course for lack of attendance. Missing more than 2 class days and more than 2 online assignments may result in the inability to receive higher than a “C” in the course.

Late Work/Make-Up Policy: Timely completion of all assignments is crucial. Please know that not completing an assignment sets you back because each assignment builds on a major assignment. It is really in your best interest to complete every assignment on time with full effort. **Late or corrected incomplete assignments will not receive extensive feedback.**

- **Late Assignments:** Assignments submitted within 1 day of the original due date will receive a half-letter grade deduction every 12 hr (up to 1 letter grade = 24hr late).
- **Missed Assignments:** Assignments that are not submitted within 1 day of the original due date are assignments that will receive a zero.
 - **You will fail the course if your MA#2 becomes a missed assignment or if you do not revise a failing MA#2 full draft (indicative of not fulfilling the course objectives).**

24-Hr Late Submission Opportunity (The “Life Happens” Clause):

- You will have **one 24-hr late submission opportunity** that you can utilize on any assignment except for time-sensitive items like the ones listed below:
 - Peer reviews, presentations, Week 5 tasks, exams, and anything else that I explicitly state cannot be submitted late.

Make-Up Policy (The “Revision” Clause): You have the opportunity to revise one assignment in this class (other than MA#2 full draft & final draft, quizzes, presentations, and peer reviews). This does not include missed assignments that you did not turn in on time. **Your revised assignment must be submitted by SN 6/29 11:59pm** and include a submission comment explaining how you have revised the assignment based on my feedback and what you have learned in the process.

Extra Credit Opportunities: Specifics will be communicated on Brightspace.

- Journal Entries Discussion Board (1 extra entry = +2pt)
- Peer responses on selective DBs + Journal (1 peer response = +.5)
- Specific opportunities related to MA#2 (more on this later)

Grading/Instructor Feedback Turnaround Time: My turnaround time for grading is pretty quick, depending on the complexity of the assignment. My general goal for this 5-week course is to have grades inputted within 72 hr of the submission deadline (unless you submit something late). If I ever give you feedback that you do not understand, please reach out and we can set up a time to go over it. I understand that you cannot improve if you do not understand the advice I am giving. Help me help you.

The Tutoring Center: Located in the ICB, Room 104 (Building #23), the Tutoring Center provides free face-to-face and online tutoring sessions to students, staff, and faculty seeking assistance for writing, reading, and oral presentations for academic and nonacademic assignments/projects. If you ever have any questions about the tutoring center, please let me know. I was a writing tutor at COM before becoming an instructor, so I can help answer any questions you might have. 😊

Any assignment containing any plagiarized material will receive a grade of zero, and the student will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for the appropriate disciplinary action.

AI Statement: Content generated by an Artificial Intelligence third-party service or site (AI-generated content) is **prohibited** in this class. While there are opportunities to use AI for certain creative low-stakes activities in my ENGL 1302 course, this is not the case for this ENGL 1301 course. Likewise, using AI without proper attribution or authorization is another form of plagiarism. If you are unsure about whether something may be plagiarism or another form of academic dishonesty, please reach out to me to discuss it as soon as possible. *Violations could result in failure of the assignment or failure of the course and a notation on your transcript.*
