Required Textbook: *Psychology 2e*, by Rose M. Spielman, William J. Jenkins, Marilyn D. Lovett; published by OpenStax. The textbook is FREE to students and can be found online in our D2L course site. To access the textbook, login to our D2L course and click the Content tab and then the Textbook link.

Course Description: General Psychology is a survey of the major psychological topics, theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Topics include scientific method, neuroscience, behavior, perception, learning, memory, intelligence, personality and psychological disorders.

Prerequisites: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test +5 or higher on Essay, OR IRW 0320 with a grade of “C” or better. This is an academic transfer course.

Course Requirements: Grades are based on points accumulated throughout the semester. There is the possibility of earning 1,000 total points from assignments and assessments. You are held accountable for completing all assignments. Instructions for assignments must be closely followed. Specific details and directions for each assignment will be on the actual assignment in D2L.

CHAPTER QUIZZES:

There will be a total of four (4) chapter quizzes that will be done online in D2L. Quizzes will be worth a maximum of 30 points each. Quizzes may have multiple choice, true/false or short answer questions. You will have 45 minutes to complete each quiz which is not long enough to look up every answer. Read the chapters and study materials before you begin the quiz. Once you open the quiz you must complete it.

UNIT EXAMS:

There will be four (4) unit exams, with a maximum value of 100 points each. Each exam will include 40 multiple choice and/or true/false questions worth a total of 80 points and a short essay section worth 20 points. Exams are timed (120 minutes). Students have ONE (1) attempt to complete the exam, with no second attempts. Complete each exam by the due date. **There are no make-up exams.** Once a student starts an exam, the student must

complete the exam – in one session. Once the time limit expires, the student will have to complete/submit the exam. Students who miss an exam may take a comprehensive final exam to take the place of the missed exam. This takes the place of one exam only. This opportunity is for students who miss an exam. Students will not have the opportunity to take this exam for extra credit (for more points).

NOTE: Please be aware that although you have one full week to take the exam, once the exam has been started it must be completed in one timed session. Do not plan to start the exam and then walk away and then return to the exam. Find a quiet location free of interruptions with a secure Internet connection. Plan to complete the exam on a laptop or desktop. Do not attempt to take the exam on one's phone or similar device.

DISCUSSION POSTS:

You will be required to complete one introduction post and a post for each chapter throughout the session. These posts are your opportunity to discuss a topic related to the assigned chapter with your peers. You will earn 10 points for an original post and 5 points for responding to one of your classmates. Use these guidelines to structure your original post and response to your classmate.

- Original post: Reply to all questions/statements made by the course professor. Use the required term(s) in your post – these are in bold font in the prompt.
- Response to classmate: Post a thoughtful response that demonstrates your knowledge of the topic. Do not write the words “good job or similar language.” The goal is to simulate conversation that would take place in the classroom.
- NOTE: Responses can be deleted at the discretion of the course professor. Responses will only be deleted if the instructor determines them to be aggressive, rude, degrading, etc., and they may be deleted without notice to the student. All such responses will receive a grade of 0 for the deleted thread.

PRESENTATION:

Students will have one presentation to complete during the 8-week. The presentation will help students examine various topics in the field of psychology and identify how these impact our society on the community, state and national level. Further, this presentation will allow students to examine the importance of being knowledgeable of their own personal biases and/or stereotypes, and how they can be more informed in their future interactions.

Each presentation post has the following instructions:

1. Research the assigned topic
2. Develop a 5-7 minute presentation on the topic.
3. Share your presentation with the class.

Your presentation will be worth a maximum of 100 points. You will earn points for quality of information and organization, quality of verbal communication, quality of non-verbal communication and the written summary. More details will be provided.

PRESENTATIONS LESS THAN 7 MINUTES WILL NOT BE GRADED!

RESEARCH SUMMARY:

You will choose a scholarly research article on a topic in psychology that interests you. You will summarize the key elements of the research article including: introduction, research methods, findings, and implications for future research. More specific instructions will be provided.

The biggest danger to successfully completing an online course with a grade you can be proud of is procrastination.

It is expected that everyone treats each other with mutual respect. In an online class, we demonstrate respect to one another by being mindful of the words and tone used in online correspondence (i.e., emails, discussion board). Online discussions in this course may include sensitive topics. It is ok to disagree with others, but it is not ok to verbally attack someone because of their ideas or beliefs.
