Course Description

Intended for Non STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) majors. Topics include introductory treatments of sets and logic, financial mathematics, probability and statistics with appropriate applications. Number sense, proportional reasoning, estimation, technology, and communication will be embedded throughout the course. Prerequisites/co-requisites: Prerequisite: TSIA2 Math 950 or Diagnostic 6 or MATH 0306 or MATH 0308 with a grade of "C" or better or co-requisite of MATH 0306 or MATH 0308. Contact Counseling to determine which math course satisfies the requirements of your desired baccalaureate program.

Course Requirements

All homework, quizzes, and exams (including the final exam) are to be completed online through MyLab Math, which is accessible through your course webpage.

After every test, you must email the instructor a picture of your scratch work. If you answer a complicated exam question correctly, but do not show any scratch work supporting that answer, you will not receive credit for that answer. It is in the sole discretion of the instructor to determine which problems are complicated and whether your scratch work justifies the answer you recorded.
