Course Description: History 1302 is a survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government, and the study of U.S. foreign policy.

This course will emphasize political, social, and economic developments, as well as other significant topics. This course (a) meets the requirements of a college transfer course for four-year degree programs (b) prepares students for upper-division coursework in history (c) prepare students for the academic rigors of upper-division coursework in the social sciences (d) prepares students for developing their critical thinking skills.

Course requirements:

Introduction Video: You will video yourself and tell us the following information.

Start by introducing yourself. Your name, things that you like to do outside of school. What is your expectation in 5 years, where to you plan to be, and what do you plan to be doing. Also if

you could have dinner with anyone from History, who would it be and why? Respond to two other posters. Please review the Rubric so you know how this discussion will be graded.

Discussion Boards: There are 5 Discussion Boards throughout the semester. Your initial post will be due before your responses, please refer to the Course Outline in this syllabus for due dates and D2L. If you do not post your initial post by the due date required you will lose points. You need to make your responses detailed, do not just say "I agree" or "Great post", take your post further. Find other sources besides the one I gave you to take your responses further, make sure in your responses that you cite those sources at the bottom of your post. If you use quotes, please cite them using in-text citations.

Exams: There will be **four exams** during the semester with a value of **100** points each, 50 points for a Multiple-Choice portion, 50 points for the Essay portion. Exam material will be drawn from quizzes, assigned readings, blackboard assignments and all class activities. Students should pay particular attention to terms in the study guides, which will be available on D2L at the beginning of the module. Each exam may consist of multiple-choice questions, short answer, and map questions

Core Objective: Critical Thinking

Essay Exams: There will be **four essay exams** during the semester, these are in addition to the multiple-choice exams you will take in class. Essay Exams will be available from the beginning of a Module, so you will have several weeks to work on these essays. The instructions for the essays will be in Blackboard. Utilizing the COM Tutoring Center is for your benefit, but for these exams it will be 10 points extra credit. If you use the textbook you MUST use a second source.

Assessment Quizzes: In addition to the four exams, there will be 15 quizzes in class to assess your progress between major exams. Quizzes will count for a total of 100 points (10 points for each quiz). Towards the end of the semester the 5 lowest quizzes will be dropped. Like exams, quizzes cannot be made up. Missed quizzes receive a grade of zero. Quizzes address the following Core Objective: Critical Thinking.

Textbook Readings, Videos, Podcasts and Lessons will all include information that will be on quizzes and exams.

Research Paper: Each student will write a 5-page research paper over a topic in US History from 1877 - 2008, this paper should be in a research paper format and **NO LESS** than 5 pages, a works cited page should be included. Follow MLA formatting guidelines, including citations and a works cited page. Paper must be double spaced Times New Roman font, 12 point. Please review rubric for grading criteria. You must use at least 5 sources. You will also be required to use the COM Tutoring center to receive feedback for your paper. This will be 15 points of your paper grade. Your paper is 75 points and tutoring is 15 points for a total of 90 points. Students will be required to turn in a Paper proposal which will include the thesis statement and sources you plan to use. The proposal is worth 25 points and detailed instructions are in D2L. **NO TEXTBOOKS** as sources for this assignment.

Oral Presentations: Each student will create an oral presentation over the topic that you wrote your research paper over. You will not read the paper but give a presentation telling us what you learned about the subject. Students will record their presentation in D2L, we must see your face.

Responsibility Paper: Students will pick a person or movement that fits into the time period of HIST 1302- 1877 to 2008. Students will write a two-page typed paper on the Social and Personal Responsibility of the subject. The student must include a paragraph in their paper discussing the social and personal responsibility of the individuals involved. Students will use **primary and secondary** sources for their paper. You must include a works cited page. You will also be required to use the COM Tutoring center to receive feedback for your paper. This will be 15 points of your paper grade. Your paper is 70 points and tutoring is 15 points for a total of 85 points **NO TEXTBOOKS** as sources for this assignment.

Covers: Critical Thinking, Social Responsibility, Personal Responsibility, Communication

Example Topic: Harriet Tubman's decision to help runaway slaves, what are the consequences of her actions? What personal responsibility does she have and how does it influence those around her? What social responsibility does she have and how does it influence those around her?

All Paper Requirements:

- Spelling and capitalization need to be correct
- All papers must have a title page, be typed, double spaced with a 12 pt font
- All pages must have appropriately sized margins.
- All papers must contain information detailed in the procedure section of these guidelines
- Do not turn in papers you have turned in for a previous class. **Determination of Course**
