1. Required Textbook

The textbook used in this course is: Finite Mathematics with Applications in the Management, Natural, and Social Sciences, Twelfth edition, by Lial, Hungerford, Holcomb and Mullins, Pearson Publishing Company. Note: you will have access to the text online via MyMathLab. You do not have to purchase a printed copy of the text.

2. Textbook Purchase

3. Course Description

The application of common algebraic functions, including polynomial, exponential, logarithmic, and rational, to problems in business, economics, and the social sciences are

addressed. The applications include mathematics of finance, including simple and compound interest and annuities; systems of linear equations; matrices; linear programming; and probability, including expected value.

4. Technology

A calculator is needed for this course. A Texas Instruments TI 83 Plus or TI 84 Plus is recommended. A TI 89 or higher cannot be used in this course.
