Course Description:

General Psychology is a survey of the major psychological topics, theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes including scientific method and theories, perception, consciousness, learning, memory, intelligence, motivation, emotion, stress, personality, psychological disorders, and therapy. Prerequisites: ENGL 1301 or TSI Reading 351 or equivalent developmental course. This is an academic transfer course.
