Course Description: This course is a survey of the development of British literature from the Romantic period until the present day. Students will study works of prose, poetry, drama, and fiction in relation to their historical, linguistic, and cultural contexts. Texts will be selected from a diverse group of authors and traditions. **Pre-requisite:** An earned grade of "C" or better in English 1301.

Course requirements:

Students will study literary selections representing the Romantic, Victorian, and Post-Modern periods. Various journal assignments, discussion boards, reading assignments, and reading quizzes will encourage a deeper analysis of each selection, evolving into a literary analysis presentation and research project. Mid-term and final exams will also be included in the coursework for the semester.

NOTE: I will give pop quizzes from time to time. This is your only warning. Don't get caught unprepared. Come to class ready to work/discuss.
