COURSE INFORMATION

Required Textbook: Invitation to The Life Span, 5th edition; by Kathleen Berger (E-book is online)

Course Description: This course will provide an overview of human development, from conception to death. We will explore how people change over time in small ways and large. We will learn about three major domains of human development (biosocial, cognitive and psychosocial) at each life stage (infancy, toddlerhood, preschool, school-aged, adolescence, early adulthood, middle adulthood and late adulthood). Finally, we will deal with the topic of death and how we cope with the end of life in this society.

Course Requirements:

Classroom Structure

If you are absent from a class session that has a classroom activity or assignment, there will be no make ups and you will receive a zero for the activity/assignment.

Students are responsible for reading the chapters from the textbook, taking in-class notes, and participating in classroom activities and discussions. This class will not be a PowerPoint lecture class only. Although lecture may be used more on some chapters than others, critical thinking activities, in-class activities, web-based interactive activities, games, debates, video clips and other methods will be used to highlight important topics within each chapter. Your chapter quizzes will cover the information from the textbook as well as any activity, discussion, video, etc. that we cover in the classroom.

Students at COM are expected to participate in every session of all classes for which they are registered. Students are encouraged to respectfully ask questions, offer differing opinions, contribute to group discussions and give personal examples as it pertains to the class lectures.

The instructor reserves the right to revise the course syllabus as required by either judgment or circumstance. Changes will be announced in class and students are responsible for recording changes as announced.

Classroom Activities: 300 points

There will be 16 classroom activities this semester. Each activity is worth 30 points. Each activity corresponds with the week's textbook chapter(s) and are developed to be fun and engaging while reviewing the material discussed. Detailed instructions will be given with each activity presented.

YouTube Project/Presentation: 100 points

There will be one YouTube Project/oral presentation which is worth 100 points towards your final grade. You will find a 3-5 minute YouTube video that addresses any topic in the book. The video must be appropriate for the classroom. You will give an oral presentation to the class in which you will discuss why your video choice is significant and what you or what you hope others will learn from your video choice. A grading rubric will be given to you several weeks before the presentation is due. Grading for this assignment will be based on the video content and your oral presentation to the class. There will be no make-ups for the presentations. You must be ready to present at the beginning of class on the assigned date.

Chapter Quizzes: 400 points

There will be a total of 16 chapter quizzes; each quiz will count for 25 points towards your final grade. Quizzes will be timed. Quizzes will be in the form of multiple choice and will cover textbook information, videos, class activities and discussions, class demonstrations and handouts. Quizzes will be taken on D2L. Quizzes will have an open and a close date. You must take each quiz within the specified time frame. There are no make-up quizzes allowed.

Final Exam: 100 points

There will be a cumulative final exam, which will cover the material over the entire semester and will count for 100 points of your final grade. The final exam will be taken in class. There will be no make-ups for the final.

DETERMINATION OF GRADE/DETAILED GRADING FORMULA

Grades are based on points accumulated throughout the semester. A variety of means to evaluate student performance will be used throughout the course. There is the possibility of earning 1000 points for exams, activities, presentations, etc. You are held accountable for completing all assignments. All directions for assignments must be closely followed.

Late and Make-Up Work:

Late submissions or make-up work on any assignment, quiz, exam, or project will not be accepted. If you are not able to attend a class, please discuss with your instructor as soon as possible.

Extra-Credit Policy: Extra credit assignments **may** be given throughout the semester if requested by student. To be eligible for extra-credit assignments, student must have missed no more than three class periods, must have submitted all assignments, and must have missed no more than one chapter exam. If these criteria are met, student has the option to speak with the instructor about completing an extra-credit assignment to supplement their final grade. No more than one extra-credit assignment can be requested.

Attendance and Participation Policy: You will receive a grade for attendance. You are allowed 2 absences without point deduction. After 2 missed classes, you will receive a 10 point deduction from your attendance grade for each class missed. Communication with your instructor is extremely important. If you are unable to attend class, call or e-mail your instructor prior to class if possible. Students are expected to attend each class. I will take attendance each class period. Regular attendance, classroom professionalism and participation are all critical components to being successful in this class.

Tardiness Policy: Students are expected to come to class on time and stay for the entire class period. 3 or more tardies or leaving class early 3 or more times will result in a student/teacher discussion and possible point deduction from your final grade. If you feel that there is a legitimate reason that you must be consistently late for class, please discuss the situation with me as soon as possible. If we have not had a discussion, you will be counted tardy.

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with your instructor must be through your COM email.
